<sup>5</sup> According to the School Nutrition Association, the 2006-07 national average for a school lunch was \$1.80 (\$1.66 for elementary schools; \$1.85 for middle schools and \$1.90 for high schools).

<sup>6</sup> These reimbursement rates do not include the value of commodities (or cash in lieu of commodities), \$0.195 for the period 7/1/09 through 6/30/10, which institutions receive as additional assistance for each lunch or supper served.
